

Our kittens have been cared for in a home environment and are therefore socialized and used to being in a home and around people. We take care of these kittens as though they were our own. Some of them have lived with us for quite some time. Some, especially small, motherless kittens, we have hand-raised, bottle fed and some we have literally saved from near death illness or life-threatening situations.

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Kitten Adoption Policies

Indoor Only: You must keep the cat indoors at all times, unless the cat is on a leash and accompanied by you. Reason: An indoor cat with proper care can live up to 20 years. The average life span of a cat who wanders outside is two years. Cats are killed and injured by cars every day on neighborhood streets as well as major roads. Other dangers include contracting diseases from other cats, getting injured by other animals, and being poisoned or abused by people who find it annoying for cats to wander onto their property.

Landlord Approval: We will require proof that you are allowed to have pets if you live in rental housing or in a condominium with animal restrictions in the by-laws. To avoid delays in adopting your pet, we will need to speak with your landlord/homeowner or see a copy of your lease.

Moving to a new home or apartment: If you are considering moving at any time please be conscious of the fact that there are pet friendly rentals but if you are not willing to pay a pet fee then perhaps you should reconsider adopting a pet, as they will be a family member for life.

Age/Employment: We seek to adopt to those who are financially secure and in a stable living situation in order to maximize the likelihood of a lifelong bond. Older teens, newly on their own, or still living with parents, may find themselves, in a year or two, making life changes that result in their no longer being able to care for their pet. Because of these reasons and as our desire is to find forever homes for our cats, **as of January 1, 2017 we have implemented 20 as a minimum age to adopt.** Additionally, as there may be, at some time, significant veterinary costs involved with any pet, we ask that people adopt only if they are adults, have seriously evaluated the meaning of a twenty year commitment and are financially able to bear the cost of future emergencies.

Family Decision: Having a pet should be a pleasant and rewarding experience for all involved. If you have small children, please bring them with you when you come for your adoption interview. Because small kittens are vulnerable and young children may be unable to predict the consequences of their actions, we are very cautious when placing a kitten under 6 months old into homes in which there are children who are less than 6 years old. Young kittens have not learned yet to retract their claws. While a scratch is typically no more harmful than falling down on a playground and scraping a knee, young children who are scratched may develop an unnecessary fear of a kitten. And, the kitten, in turn, may become fearful of a child who cries after being scratched. Children and pets make wonderful companions for one another when supervised and matched up appropriately. Our Adoption Volunteers will work with you to determine the best fit for your family.

Current/Past Pets: Before we place any animal, we ensure that other pets in the household and all pets owned by the prospective adopter in the last five years, are/were spayed/neutered and current on vaccinations, including rabies and distemper. Please provide copies of your pet's vet records or provide a veterinarian contact.

Kittens as Gifts: We have gift certificates available for those wishing to give a gift adoption. Please note that adopters (the adult or adults with whom the cat will live) must meet with a cat or kitten prior to adoption; choosing a cat is a very personal decision and plays an important role in making a lifelong commitment to a new family member.

Lifetime Commitment: We expect that when you adopt a pet you have made a decision to care for that pet for its entire life. A cat may be a 20 year commitment. Please think through this extremely important decision before you come to the shelter. A pet becomes a family member. A responsible pet owner/guardian makes life decisions to include their pets.
